When you step into the Navy Seal Group at Nanning Silver Lining Rehabilitation Center, you often see a little child with a sweet smile. Whether you know him or not, he always greets you warmly and enthusiastically. His name is Kang Kang.

Kang Kang comes from a small mountain village in Guangxi. A few months after he was born, he was diagnosed with cerebral palsy. This news plunged Kang Kang's family into crisis. In order to provide treatment for their child, Kang Kang's father sold almost everything they had. A few years later, Kang Kang's mother left the family, and Kang Kang's father had to bring the two children to Nanning alone, embarking on a long road to recovery.



Because he had to accompany Kang Kang during his training and had no source of income, Kang Kang's father had no choice but to borrow money from relatives and friends, and even take out loans. Silver Lining understood the difficulties Kang Kang's father faced and applied for living assistance to alleviate the family's financial burden.

With the support of living assistance, Kang Kang's father could finally take a breath and no longer felt so helpless. He devoted all his thoughts to Kang Kang's rehabilitation. In order to give Kang Kang more training time, he woke up early and worked late into the night, seizing every second. If Kang Kang couldn't step, he held his child's feet with his hands and taught him step by step. If Kang Kang couldn't eat, he held his child's hand and taught him how to use a spoon. If Kang Kang had poor grip strength, he used the evening time to practice building blocks with his child... Thanks to his father's efforts, Kang Kang made great progress. After more than a year of training at Silver Lining, Kang Kang moved up from the preschool group to the school-age group. He learned to walk with the help of a walking aid, learned to dress and undress himself, and acquired a certain level of self-care skills.



After Kang Kang entered the schoolage group, his father no longer needed to accompany him in rehabilitation every day. Kang Kang's father could go out to work, and their lives gradually became stable. Kang Kang's father used to be a manager in a factory, but he gave up his managerial position to become a truck driver in order to support his child's recovery. Many relatives and friends advised him not to go to such lengths for his child and urged him to face reality. Faced with various persuasions, Kang Kang's father still chose to be with his child. For the sake of their livelihood, Kang Kang's father took on various jobs, such as a truck driver, manual laborer, ditch digger, fruit seller, and street vendor. He was willing to do any dirty or heavy work. Kang Kang's father said that as long as his child made

progress and lived happily, all the hardships were insignificant.

Someone asked Kang Kang's father if he had ever regretted his choices. Kang Kang's father said, "If you measure my current life in terms of wealth, I am poor. But I have never regretted my choices because my spirit and mind are rich. I have not let my child down, and I have not abandoned my responsibility as a father. Every day, when I see their smiling faces, I feel that my world is filled with light."

Kang Kang's father is just a representative of ordinary fathers at Silver Lining. At Silver Lining, there are many fathers like him who silently contribute for their families and children. They show us the perseverance of a great father and the power of paternal love like a mountain. We salute this group of ordinary yet great fathers!

In order to enhance the social adaptation ability of disabled youth, on August 24, 2023, eight disabled youth from Guangxi Silver Lining embarked on a train to Fang Cheng Gang in their motorized wheelchairs, setting off on a "spontaneous trip."

A Spontaneous Trip

This event was mainly organized by the young students of Guangxi Silver Lining Disabled Youth Workshop. The young people said that they have always gone out under the well-arranged plans of Silver Lining, accompanied by their parents and assistants. They wanted to have an "impromptu trip" to experience independence. Having ideas is motivation, and having the courage to implement them is bravery. The social workers praised the youth for their courage and fully supported them in stepping out of their comfort zone and challenging themselves.

The event took a total of three days from planning to execution. Under the guidance of the social workers, the youth discussed the travel plans. What difficulties might they encounter during the trip? How should the routes be arranged? How to solve



accommodation and meals? The youth discussed and resolved each item one by one. They made phone calls to subway stations and high-speed rail stations to inquire about accessibility facilities, confirmed the mode of transportation, searched maps to determine the travel routes, and found desired hotels through their "social circle" support. From planning to resource search to implementation, there were doubts, frustrations, and dilemmas. But when everything was settled, the youth felt a great sense of accomplishment.

On August 24th, the eight youth set off in their motorized wheelchairs, carrying their backpacks, and began their dream journey. Everything seemed ordinary, yet everything was extraordinary. They departed from Nanning at 7:30 and arrived in Fang Cheng Gang at 11:00. When they touched the seawater, the eight youth were very excited. Laughter mixed with the sound of waves, and the youth let themselves loose in the sea. They shouted into the ocean, lay flat on the beach, splashed water at each other, and joyfully dug in the sand... It was as if the entire ocean belonged to them, and their smiling faces outlined the beauty of youth!

The three-day dream journey was short, with most of the time spent on the road. However, it was a journey that turned dreams into reality. Throughout the





process, the social workers and assistants only provided necessary help in daily life, leaving most of the decision-making power to the youth. After the event, the youth shared that wheelchair travel was not as difficult as they had imagined, and they even eagerly planned a second "spontaneous trip."

The success of this trip would not have been possible without the support and assistance of various caring organizations and individuals in society. Subway and high-speed rail staff opened green channels for the youth. Guesthouse owners provided convenient accommodation and meals, and even rented swimming rings for the youth... everyone's support and kindness warmed and inspired the youth, and it strengthened their confidence to bravely pursue their dreams. We sincerely hope that every youth can surpass themselves and live a wonderful life!

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Ah Mao is the eldest brother in our family, he's 16 years old and even taller than me. Ah Mao is very considerate; when he sees me tired, he tells me to rest, when it's cold, he asks if I need a jacket, and when it rains, he brings me an umbrella. He often comforts me with kind words. Who would have thought that this gentle, kind, warm-hearted guy" has no blood relation to me at all?

Ah Mao and his two siblings came to our home five years ago. They say, "Happy families are all alike; every unhappy family is unhappy in its own way." Ah Mao's family was similar to many poor families in Myanmar. When he was five years old, his father went to work in a distant place. At first, they still had sporadic contact, but one day he disappeared without a trace, and all communication stopped.

With the loss of the family's source of income, Ah Mao's mother could only rely on her ailing grandmother to help take care of the three children while she went out to work. However, no matter how hard she tried, she couldn't provide for









the livelihood of the whole family. Later, when Ah Mao's mother learned about Silver Lining Foster Home in Lashio, she requested the local pastor to contact us, and that's how Ah Mao and his siblings came to our home.

I remember the first time I saw Ah Mao, he was a completely naive, short and chubby child who spoke very little. At that time, my house wasn't built yet, so we lived together with other students in the school. Whenever I tried to talk to him, he would hide and refuse to call me "Mother Yang" no matter what. After the outbreak of the pandemic in 2019, the school was closed, and I moved back to our newly built house with my own children. With no busy school work, I had more time to spend with the children. Every day, I would set aside time to chat and play with them, teach them their homework, listen to their childhood

stories, and give them big hugs. Of course, when they made mistakes, I would gently reprimand them. I don't know when it started, but Ah Mao began to share his stories with me, talk about happy things, and gradually, "Mother Yang" became his most affectionate way of addressing me.

Ah Mao would often tell me, "We are truly fortunate! When we were younger, most of the time, it was just the three siblings at home, and we would have watery rice or salted vegetables for every meal. It was only in the foster home that we felt a sense of family."

Seeing the children's growth, I am also filled with joy. Of course, I have to thank Silver Lining for their support, which has given us the opportunity and ability to take care of these children who need love and care.





Guangxi Silver Lining 2023 Charity Sharing Dinner

Meeting the Euture



On November 18–19, 2023, Dahua Silver Lining Social Work organized a youth growth camp titled "Meeting the Future" for 19 teenagers studying in vocational schools and universities in Dahua. In the eyes of young people, the future is filled with boundless imagination and possibilities, but it is only through proper planning and practical efforts that these prospects can become reality.

During the camp, social workers led the teenagers in sharing their professional knowledge and discussing the future development direction of their respective fields. They also stood together with the teenagers, envisioning what they would be doing in the year of their graduation. When focusing only on the present, it is rare to consider the future. But as the teenagers lined up according to their expected graduation year, a sense of urgency surged. The shape of your future is determined by every action you take and every step you make now. By choosing a suitable career direction and working hard, you can decide the shape of your life.





"What do others see me as?" "What is the thing you care about the most?" It's common for teenagers aged 16-17 to be concerned about how others perceive them. The social workers had the teenagers write down the areas they care about the most, and then categorized their concerns as controllable, indirectly controllable, or uncontrollable. They discussed how to deal with each category. The teenagers expressed their own opinions, ultimately believing that for controllable issues, they should take proactive measures; for indirectly controllable ones, they should seek a winwin scenario, and for uncontrollable ones, they should learn to accept them. The social workers encouraged the teenagers to evaluate each other, helping them learn



to face evaluation anxiety. During the sharing session, the teenagers expressed their surprise, saying, "I didn't expect to have so many strengths in the eyes of others. It feels warm to be understood."

The camp also focused on providing opportunities for the teenagers to relax and relieve stress. They listened to their concerns, alleviated anxiety and pressure, clarified their professional and future development directions, and helped them face their academics and life with a positive mindset.







Keep going! You can do it!

As time passes by in a hurry, I'm turning eighteen in the blink of an eye. How have I changed from before? I often reflect on this, and I feel that there have been significant changes over these past few years.

I remember back in my hometown, I was known as a "troubled teenager." I used to smoke, drink, and get into fights with my group of "brothers." I disregarded the teachings of my teachers and parents. When they asked me, "What is your dream?" I would argue with them, feeling that they didn't understand me, so why should they teach me?

I thought that this was how my life would be, as most young people in the village were like this. But what I didn't expect was that the gears of destiny started turning, and everything took a new turn. My family didn't want me to live a mediocre life forever. With the help of a pastor, they assisted me in submitting an application to the Grace Youth Shelter. I strongly resisted at first, but to no avail. So, on March 1, 2020, I arrived at the Grace Youth Shelter in Pyin Oo Lwin.

Life at the Grace Youth Shelter was "boring." I had to wake up on time every day, wash up, and then study Chinese, the Bible, prayer, and worship. I didn't like this kind of life; there were too many restrictions. But I realized that I had no other choice. I had no money, and I was



unfamiliar with the place. Myanmar was chaotic, and I didn't dare wander around aimlessly. So, I told myself to endure it for a few years, and then I would be liberated.

Since I couldn't leave, I had to gradually settle down. At the Grace Youth Shelter, I made new friends who didn't know about my past or didn't care about it. Everyone here had their own difficulties, some lost family members due to war, and others had to work odd jobs due to poverty. But most of them were very hardworking, as if everyone had their own dreams. So, what was my dream? That was the question my parents once asked me.

I tried to chat with the ministers, and under their patient guidance, I got to know my past and present self again. The old






me didn't like studying and often got into fights just to fit in; otherwise, I would be excluded. But at the Grace Youth Shelter, I no longer needed that facade. I stopped getting into fights and started focusing on studying. My grades gradually improved.

One day, I received a phone call from home. My father suddenly passed away, and our family lost its pillar of support. I could no longer argue with him, nor could I be the little kid hiding behind him. From that day on, I felt that I had grown up, and I needed to take on the responsibility of taking care of my family.

"What is your dream?" When the minister asked me this question again, it reminded me of my father's teachings that I had ignored. Everyone should have a dream because having a dream gives us direction and motivation to move forward. I think my dream is to become a minister who follow's God's will and serves the Lord! From now on, I will double my efforts and prepare myself well.

After more than three years at the Grace Youth Shelter, I sincerely want to say "thank you" to all the teachers. And finally, I want to say to myself, "Keep going! You can do it!"





Bright and Promising

The children at our Silver Lining Family Village come from different parts of Myanmar, gathering in a place filled with love and hope. Today, I want to share the story of a boy named Zhi Qiang, who is a particularly active child in our center.

Zhi Qiang came to the Silver Lining Family Village when he was eight years old, along with his older brother and cousins. The first time I met Zhi Qiang, he gave me quite a "gift." I had just arrived at the center and was getting settled when a child came running up to me and said, "Teacher, Zhi Qiang caught a snake and is playing with it in the room." My mind exploded with fear as I am terrified of snakes. What should I do?

Fortunately, there were other teachers present at the time who had more experience dealing with unexpected situations like this. They calmly explained to Zhi Qiang, "You shouldn't catch snakes and treat them as toys because they can

be poisonous and harm people." Thus, the chaotic incident came to an end, leaving me both laughing and exasperated.

Zhi Qiang is the youngest child in our center, but he has a large bowl for eating. Every time he eats, his entire head almost disappears into the food, which is both funny and heartwarming. Zhi Qiang and his brother never received much love from their parents. Their mother left home, and their father was often absent. I believe Zhi Qiang had experienced years of hunger and deprivation.

Zhi Qiang is a child with ideas. At the Silver Lining Family Village, I primarily teach the children the Myanmar language. One day, Zhi Qiang approached me and asked for help in learning Burmese. Many children in the center struggle with the basics of the language and find it difficult to learn. They tend to resist learning Burmese. However, Zhi Qiang took the initiative to express his desire to learn,



which impressed me greatly. I told him that besides learning the basics of words, phrases, and sentences, he also needed to read extensively. There were no shortcuts, only consistent effort and accumulation. Since then, I often see Zhi Qiang diligently studying, and I do my best to guide him.

One day, while having a meal with Zhi Qiang, I praised his rapid improvement in reading ability. He happily shared his method with me. He said that whenever he saw Burmese signs on the way to school, he would try to read them aloud with his classmates. Gradually, his vocabulary accumulated, and his joyful expression was truly delightful.

Zhi Qiang is a child with a strong personality. One time, he got into a fight with someone, and his angry little face turned red. I took him aside and taught him that conflicts can be resolved in many ways, and there must be better alternatives than fighting. Surprisingly, he

quickly accepted and acknowledged his mistake. Afterwards, Zhi Qiang shared with me that he thought I would scold him, but I didn't. He felt respected and understood that I wanted what was best for him.

Children need attention and motivation from their teachers. I have grown to love this mischievous and intellectually active child more and more. Although he can be both likable and worrisome, and even make me angry at times, he often inspires my understanding of education. Zhi Qiang is an exceptional child, and I believe his future will be filled with a different and brilliant path.

She is the youngest at Silver Lining Family Village. Due to her small stature, her big, sparkling eyes make her appear younger than her age. So, everyone at home calls her "Little Elder." However, she is actually a responsible and well-behaved child, polite and with a strong sense of responsibility.

Her name is Xiao Ping, she is 10 years old, and she has three siblings who are also at Silver Lining Family Village, under the care of Mom Maria. They came to Silver Lining Family Village four years ago. At that time, her father had passed away, and her mother went missing during the displacement caused by the conflict. It is a sad story, but in Myanmar, such tragic stories happen frequently. I am always grateful that Silver Lining Family Village exists, providing a reliable home for these displaced children.

Xiao Ping is currently in the second grade of primary school. When I first arrived at Silver Lining Family Village, she was in my class, just starting first grade. At that time, her reading ability was weak, but she was extremely diligent in her studies. Every morning, she would wake up at five—thirty and be present in the classroom on time.

It's hard to imagine a six-year-old child having such strong self-discipline. In class, she always listens attentively to the





teacher and practices writing diligently. Gradually, her handwriting improved, and when I praised her for writing well, she became even more determined. After a year of hard work, her reading ability has greatly improved, and her overall proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing in Myanmar language has also increased.

Every child is an angel in this world, and you never know how warm their hearts can be! Xiao Ping not only works hard in her studies but also serves as a thoughtful helper at home. In the morning, she never requires her mother's assistance. She



folds her own blanket neatly and then washes her face and brushes her teeth. During mealtime, she helps her mother set the table and proactively cleans up and washes the dishes after eating before going to Myanmar language school. In the evening, it is time for family prayers, and she joins her mother in a peaceful prayer. The actions of this little child warm the hearts of everyone around her, allowing us to see a beautiful world and a promising future.

Xiao Ping's dream is to become a pastor, and I believe she will become an excellent one. I am also willing to help her grow well so that she can step into a better future.
